

All of them are profiled in this magazine through their achievements this summer. Most are No.1 in the country and achieved the qualifying standards to represent England in these Games - a tribute to their undoubted talent, hard work, effort and persistence.

This is the first time in history that these Commonwealth Youth Games are being held in Asia. The city of Pune, the cultural capital of Maharashtra, is a fast growing Metropolis and over 1,300 athletes and 350 Officials from 71 countries will participate in the games there. We wish well our six young promising stars and look forward to reporting their successful achievements in the December Harrier.

The first Commonwealth Youth Games were held in 2000 in Edinburgh where 733 athletes from 14 countries vied for 483 medals in 8 sports including athletics. The second edition of the games was held in Bendigo, Australia in 2004 with over 1000 athletes competing. It is expected that more than 1300 athletes from 71 countries around the world will participate in these third Commonwealth Youth Games.

50.52m, the Shot 14.90m, the Hammer 45.29m, the Javelin
46.8m0 and the Weight 15.68m. To complete a successful
championships he also took two 5th places in the Shot and
Weight Throw, the latter being a PB of 15.65.

A number of Birchfield Harriers, including Jonathan Moore, were also invited as guests.

Leaving the gloomy and miserable weather behind at Manchester airport, the Sale Harriers contingent boarded a small 50-seat chartered aircraft with high hopes for an enjoyable trip. Having a plane laid on specifically for us was a club first according to Eric, and the Captain made the experience complete by wishing Sale Harriers the best of luck over the public address system. Someone had to draw the short straw, and I found myself seated next to Allyn Condon, who regaled me with stories of mischief that involved near death experiences at the hands of angry shot putters, as well as tales of a more risqué nature. The flight was smooth despite the aircraft's diminutive size, and we touched down on Guernsey to be greeted by the most glorious sunshine imaginable. We had three athletes represent Britain in the Beijing Olympics.

KATE DENNISON

She failed with all

Kate, Britain's No.1 pole vaulter failed to reach the final despite a personal best of 4.40m.

three attempts at
4.50m and admitted
she suffered from
entering the
competition at the
opening height of
4.00m. "It was an outdoor
PB which was nice but jumping
from the start of the competition right to
the end I think I just burnt myself out," said
Dennison, who saw world record holder
Elena Isinbaeva need just one attempt at
4.60m to qualify automatically. "I wasn't
jumping technically well, I was just fighting
and fighting," added Dennison. "It was so
hot out there and we were out there for a
good three hours but I'm fairly happy. You
can't be too disheartened with top 15 in
the Olympics compared to jumping 4.20 in
Osaka last year. "It would have been nice
to make that final but give me another year
and I'll be up there."

ANDY TURNER

Andy Turner didn't make it through the second round of the 110m hurdles. He finished 5th in heat 2 of the second round, clocking 13.53.

This was Andy's second
Olympic Games, following
his debut at Athens 2004. In
2006, he also won bronze at both
the European Championships and
Commonwealth Games. A club member
since October 2005, he holds the 110m
hurdles club record (13.27s) achieved at last
year's World Championships in Osaka. He
trains full-time at the UK Athletics North
London High Performance Centre at Lee
Valley. Andy is also a very accomplished
sprinter and it is in the 100m and 200m that
he usually represents the club, which he did
at our first league match this year and at the
European Champion Clubs' Cup, where he
won both the 110mH and the 200m.

ALEX NELSON

Whilst team-mates Christian Malcolm and Marlon Devonish progressed as the fastest losers in the early 200m heats, Alex Nelson

200m heats, Alex Nelson became a non-starter after sustaining a hamstring injury in warm-up.

Alex, the current European Junior Champion and medalist at

the World Junior Championships (2006) and the World Youth Championships (2005) joined the club in October 2006. His sister Ashlee represented Britain in the 4x100m squad.

NORMAN POOLE We also had our top coaches,

We also had our top coaches, NORMAN POOLE, selected to represent and support Britain's middle distance runners.

Norman is a highly respected endurance coach whose athletes currently include Tom Lancashire (1500m) & Michael Rimmer (800m) (both of who ran in Beijin) and three other women who have broken two minutes for 800m. He has been associated with Sale Harriers for over 30 years and such is his national reputation, he holds the prestigious position of President of the British Milers Club. This BMC is the premier middle distance athletics club in the country and through its racing program, training courses and coaching it aims to improve the world standing of UK Middle Distance running. Norman's list of endurance athletes whom he's coached over the years are too numerous to list. This was not his first time to be selected for a major championship. He's represented British athletes at previous Olympic, World and Commonwealth Championships.

WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Three of the club's most exciting prospects represented GB at the World Junior Championships at Bydgoszcz in Poland in July. Not only do we congratulate, SHAUNNA THOMPSON (200m) and ABIGAIL IROZURU (Long jump) and 2nd claim SOPHIE HITCHON (Hammer) for their fine achievements in these Games but we wish them well as they increasingly target London 2012. Athletes who take part in the World Junior Championships often go on to become global champions and, with London 2012 looming ever more large, their success in this major international championship is invaluable experience.

SHAUNNA THOMPSON In a high quality 200m semi-final, sixteen year old Shaunna gave it her all and narrowly missed out on an automatic qualification, finishing third in her heat. Her time of 23.85 failed to earn her a fastest loser place which went to runners up in the final heat, a quicker race. Competing in her first international abroad (she'd earlier competed at the Loughborough International) and against girls several years older, she did brilliantly. Rarely defeated domestically, she ranks first not only in the UK U/17 rankings but also in the older U/20 200m listings. She qualified for Poland with her PB of 23.44 set at May's Northern U/17 Championships. Said Shaunna, "The heats went really well and it was a great experience." Asked what impressed her most she said, "Walking onto the track and

seeing a full stadium. It was weird1 ...and to think they're all there to see you".

ABIGAIL IROZURU came eighth in the long jump final but could have gone further with a more consistent performance. Her first jump was not recognized, she then went on to jump 6.04m (0.8m/s) and 5.91m (1.7m/s). Her great second jump of 6.16m (1.7m/s) was just under her season's best of 6.18m, set in Birmingham in June, but her following efforts did not keep to that standard. What invaluable experience for Britain's No.1 U/20 long-jumper! Abigail made her international debut last year representing Britain at the World Youths Games in Ostrava. This year she represented Britain in the GBR v Netherlands indoor match in February and the Loughborough International in May.

SOPHIE HITCHON is a 2nd claim member of the club and a higher competition athlete. She made the hammer final - finishing 7th with a throw of 58.45m. She took up the hammer only two years ago and, still just 17 years old, has shown such tremendous improvement that she now ranks Britain's No.1 in both the U/17 & U/20 rankings and 5th in the senior listings. She said, "I'm really pleased, my aim was to get to the final and get top eight and I did that so I'm pleased." Prior to last year when she made her first big step onto international competition competing at the IAAF World Youth Championships, she'd never previously been even to an English Schools competition and competed largely in local league matches. This

summer she broke the UK junior hammer record in only her second outdoor competition at an international match in Germany. She wrote for Athletics Weekly (July 17th p78), "Competing at Bydgoszcz was a far cry from my earlier achievements in athletics".

Held every two years, some of our homegrown athletes have medalled in these Championships and then went on to become global champions. Some were:

DARREN CAMPBELL: Darren won 100m &200m silver and 4 x 100 relay silver in the Seoul games of 1992. In fact, Darren holds the record for having the longest gap between becoming a World Junior Champion and a global Senior Champion for the first time with an eleven year and 343 days gap between his winning sprint relay gold and the Olympic Relay gold in 2004!

KEVIN McKAY won 800m silver at the Sudbury Games in 1988.

ALLYN CONDON won gold in the 4 x 100m relay in Seoul in 1992.

Other club athletes who medalled in World Junior Championships were FIONA MAY (long Jump gold in 1998), KERRI MADDOX (silver in the 100m hurdles in 1990) and ALEX NELSON (200m silver in 2006). Finally, Tom Lancashire (Bolton Ac) & Michael Rimmer (L'pool Pem), coached at Wythenshawe by Norman Poole, are strong senior GB team members who competed in Beijing.



ENGLAND ATHLETICS U/17 & U/15 CHAMPIONSHIPS

The club had six competitors in this year's Norwich Union England Athletics U/17 & U/15 Championships held at the Alexander Stadium in August with SHAUNNA THOMPSON winning both the medals - gold in the 200m and silver in the 100m. It was a very rare 100m defeat for the country's No.1 young sprinter, losing out to Jodie Williams (Herts Pheonix AC) In fact, she's 'lost' only three 100m races in the past three years, strangely the other two in August 2006 & 2007! The consolation was that her time of 11.64 was a PB



This has been the culmination of yet another fantastic year of achievements for Britain's No1 young sprinter:

Northern Indoor 60m & 200m Champion for the 3rd consecutive year.

International debut at the Lougborough International

Northern U/17 Outdoor 100m & 200m Champion for 3rd consecutive year.

English Athletics U/20 200m silver medallist (whilst still only 16 years old!)

Represented GB with excellence at the

IAAF World Junior championships in Poland.

England Athletics Outdoor 200m Champion & 100m silver medallist.

Others who competed were the Northern U/17 javelin champion & double Cheshire County & Schools champion DANIELLE BENTLEY who finished 5th in 35.45 in the javelin; HANNAH DOHERTY, despite being only 15-years old did really well to finish in a lifetime best time of 4:35.85 finishing 6th in the U/17 1500m; NAYEF ABED was 8th in the U/17 100m and Gt. Manchester Schools champions for two consecutive years GREG APPLEBY was 9th in the U/15 pole vault in 2:60m.















ENGLAND ATHLETICS U/20 & U/23 CHAMPIONSHIPS

World Juniors Calling

The English Athletics age-group Championships are key pinnacles in the athletic calendar and major objectives for most talented athletes. This year the U/20 & U/23 Championships incorporated the World Junior Trials and were held at the Bedford international Stadium in June. We had a total of twenty athletes compete and they returned home with two gold, three silver and two bronze medals... and two qualified for the IAAF World Junior Championships in Poland on July 10th!

The gold medallists were ADELE LASSU in the U/20 high jump and ABIGAIL IOZURU in the U/20 long jump. Adele's retained her U/20 high jump title from last year and recorded a season's best of 1:74m.

This was one of Abigail's finest domestic victories and Britain's No.1 long jumper did it in impressive style with a PB of 6.29m. It set her up beautifully to represent Britain at the IAAF World Junior Games in Poland three weeks later.

The three silver medallists were ALEX SMITH (U/23 hammer), STEPHANIE PYWELL (U/23 high jump) & SHAUNNA THOMPSON (U/20 200m).

Alex, was a year young in this older age-group and a silver medal was a tremendous achievement. Next year, Britain's No.1 U/20 hammer thrower will surely clinch the gold!

16-year old Shaunna was also competing in an older age-group and her silver medal was not only a fantastic result but a significant improvement on last year's 6th place in this championship. With her PB of 23.44 at the northern championships a few weeks earlier where she achieved the qualifying standard for the World Junior Championships, she was off

Though 1.78m was not Stephanie Pywell's best jump, this silver medal for Britain's No.2 high jumper was probably her finest in a major domestic Championship to date.

The two bronze medallists were ANDY SUT-CLIFFE in the U/20 pole vault & MATT CULLEN in the U/23 pole vault.

This bronze medal was probably also Andv's finest in a major championship and capped a great week in which he earlier became the Northern U/20 Pole vault Champion with a PB of 4.90m.

Training partner Matt Cullen also recorded a PB of 4.45m a week earlier at the same Northern Championships and his U/23 championship bronze medal was probably also his most valued to date.



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Baying for Beijing

This year's Aviva National T & F Championships held in July moved back to the Alexander Stadium in **Birmingham from Sportcity where** they had been held for the past 3i summers. Being the major domestic T & F championship with national medals up for grabs it always promised to be a nail-biting three days of athletics. It also had the added tension of selection for the greatest show on earth - the Beijing Olympics. Participants knew that, despite posting the qualifying standard and finishing in the first two there was still no simple guarantee of a place on the plane. (Trafford AC's Rick Yates (whose parents are Club athletes), and club athletes, hammer specialist Mike Floyd and Britain's No.1 steeplechaser Stuart Stokes can vouch for that).

MIKE FLOYD: Following three successive silver medals in these national Championships, Mike was the first club athlete of the weekend to claim a national title. He produced a timely Hammer PB to win with a second round PB throw of 69.68m. In a consistent series, he had five valid throws. Floydy said: "It's eight years since my last big throw so those two PBs were a long time coming. I didn't really care about the distance I just wanted to win. The weather hasn't been the best for training, but I always seem to throw well in Birmingham." Mike is now No.1 in Britain!

ALEX SMITH: claimed the bronze medal behind Mike Floyd with 67.21m. Had he thrown his PB of 69.56m, set the previous weekend in Croatia, he would have snatched the silver medal. Alex ranks nationally No.2 behind Floydy but is No.1 in the U/23 listings. This season Mike & Alex have met seven times at high profile meetings with Mike coming out on top in all of them.

ANDY TURNER: could enjoy taking his third successive UK National Championship 110m hurdles title because he'd achieved the qualifying standard & PB last year. Despite managing to hit the majority of the hurdles, he was pushed to the line but had enough advantage to take the title in 13.58.

NICK GAYLE: last season's U/23 Champion, was still trying to break 14 seconds this season & finished 8th in 14.02. He set his PB of 13.94 last summer.

EMMA LYONS: chose an ample opportunity to set a new PB of 4.12m in taking the women's pole vault title. She is also the 2008 Midland Senior champion.

ABIGAIL HAYWOOD: hot-heeled it from Gateshead where she'd won English Schools

pole-vault silver to Birmingham for another tough competition the following day. She finished 6th.

ALISON RODGER: took the Shot Putt bronze medal in 15.78m and so improved last year's 4th place. In the discus her 9th place was identical to last year but below her best of 46.16m.

REBECCA PEAKE: Rebecca was just behind Alison Rodger in 4th so just missed out on a medal in 15.36m. The 2008 Inter-counties & BUSA Shot Champion set her PB of 16.23m at the Loughborough University v BUSA trials meeting in June.

LAURA DOUGLAS: retained the hammer bronze medal she won last year but with a shorter throw. Her best of 63.02m was set at June's Welsh Senior championships when she clinched silver & ranks her 4th nationally. Another summer highpoint was retaining the North Wales Hammer title.

SARAH HOLT: Although Sarah ranks 3rd nationally (with a PB of 63.75m) and above Laura in the UK listings, she finished behind Laura in a below par performance. She is this year's Yorkshire Champion & Northern silver medalist.

SARAH TOMLINS: came 4th in the 400m 'B' race in 56.12. Sarah hails from the south of England and is the 2008 Sussex 400m Silver medalist.

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GARETH RAVEN: was 18th in the 5000m in a time of 14.25.87. s. In the run up to this championship, he established a new 10,000m track PB of 29.32.71 and a 5k PB of 14.09.21. It's been one of Gaz's best years and he continues to rank among the top ten of Britain's endurance elite.

PAUL WALKER: was 4th in Pole Vault in 4.85m. With a PB of 5.40m from last year's U/23 English Athletics championships, Paul had hoped for better. He is the current Welsh champion & BUSA bronze medalist.

MARCUS GOULDBOURNE: was 9th in the discus with a throw of 48.84m. Marcus' PB of 58.69m goes back two years and this was the first throw for several years that went below 50m.

STUART STOKES: When our Manchester & Melbourne Commonwealth Games steeplechase finalist broke his PB 8:23.66 at an international meeting in Prague a few weeks earlier & clocked the Beijing qualifying time, it stirred excitement that he might finally make it to his first Olympics. His 4th place in 8:44.02 sadly put the dream out of reach! Three weeks later, he became the latest of the Club's sub -30 minute elite with a superb 29.29 in July's Gt. Welsh 10k.

GLEN COMISH: currently ranking 6th with a PB of 8:34.92 was 6th in the steeplechase in 8:49.61.

SONIA SAMUELS (nee Thomas): A 3000m steeplechase medal continues to elude Sonia. In this her 3rd attempt, she finished 5th in 10.26.14.

RUTH WALLER: Currently residing in the USA

and with a 3k steeplechase PB of 11.01.82 set in June 2007, jet-lagged Ruth ensured that, though her spirit was willing, her flesh would allow only eight place in 11: 25.60.

JACOB BROWN: Though 7th in the long jump, Jacob's leap of 7.57m was a superb PB - his second of the summer. An earlier highpoint was retaining his Northern Senior silver medal.

STEVE SMALL: was 13th in the long jump. Steve's two summer highpoints were his PB set in June at the Golden spike Meeting in the Netherlands and representing the Club at the European Champions Club Cup where his third placing greatly helped Sale become European

NICK NEWMAN: was 16th with a 7.05 longjump. This was only his second of a few outdoor competitions this summer. His first was in May at a New Balance Meeting in New York when he recorded his PB of 7.48m.

STEPH PYWELL: set a season's best of 1.88m in winning the women's high jump to improve on last year's bronze medal & produce possibly her most pleasing result of the summer.

JULIE CRANE: Welsh international Julie finished an uncharacteristic 11th, the result of a long injury lay-off that involved surgery. She relaunched her campaign in June to get back to the top by becoming the Midland Senior

SARA McGREAVY: (100m hurdles) was pushed into the silver medal position by Sarah Claxton (Woodford Green Essex Ladies). One of the club's valuable loyal team members, she retained her CAU inter-county title for the second consecutive year.

ALEX NELSON: The men's 200m final was impressive with European Junior champion Alex pushed into second place by Christian Malcolm who took the title by overtaking Nelson in the final stage. Alex bettered the Olympic 'A' standard in winning the BAL match at Eton in 20.49


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
















Northern Champions



As well as 23 competitors in the English Schools Championships, we also had a Welsh Schools champion and a silver medallist from the event held at Brecon on July 5th.

The week following GAIL LIPPITT winning her bronze medal at the Scottish U/20 400m Championships in mid-June, she became the Welsh 400m Schools Champion and added this to last year's bronze medal. Still on the crest of a wave, she further improved her PB at the NJAL Premier League match at Sportcity two weeks later.

CHARLIE HULSON, whilst a year young, won the U/17 800m silver medal in 2:03.06 just a little slower than his PB of 2:00.08 at the Trafford Grand Prix achieved directly prior to the championship. He went on to compete in the Home International schools in Bedford, where again most of the athletes were a year older, and finished 8th in 2:02.55. Charlie demonstrated his running pedigree last winter by winning the bronze medal in Northern XC Championships and finishing a magnificent 8th in the inter-counties X.C Championships. An 800m/1500m specialist, he won all the NYAL races that he has competed in and improved his PB's from 2.07min to 2.00 min for 800m. His 1500m time has also come down from 4.22 to 4.13.

With athletes such as SHAUNNA THOMPSON, ANDY SUTCLIFFE, ANDY ROBERTSON, ROBYN RASHFORD, MIKE EHLAN, SOPHIE HITCHON either injured or on international duty, the Sale contingent did not win as many titles as last year but still performed magnificently across a wide variety of events across all the age groups. These, plus other talented youngsters like SARAH BARKER, GRACE SMITH, KATIE BYERS, PHIL KENNEDY and JAMES DAVIES might have expected to do well.

REBEKAH WILSON GOLD 100m 12.02

Rebekah's gold medal puts her among the club's most successful ever athletes in English Schools championships. The multi Gt. Manchester 100m Schools Champion was the English Schools U/15 100m bronze medallist in 2005; the U/17 silver medallist in 2006 (& UK Schools Bronze medallist) and the intermediate Gold medallist & International Schools Gold medallist in 2007. Her current PB of 11.90m was achieved at June's Northern U/20 championships.

ABIGAIL HAYWOOD SILVER Pole vault 3.60m

Abigail is the 2006 English Schools Gold medallist and also the UK Schools Gold medallist. Last year, she finished 4th in the intermediate championships. Her senior silver medal puts her back among Britain's best pole vaulters. Her PB of 3.85m was set earlier at the Northern U/20 championships and ranks her 3rd in the UK U/20 listings.

NIALL BROOKS SILVER 800m 1:52.06

From last year's 7th in the intermediate semi-final, Niall has made such magnificent strides that he's become one of Britain's most exciting middle-distance prospects. Not only did he win the senior silver medal this year but missed out on the gold by just a whisker! Niall has improved his PB from 1:58.95 in last year's championships to 1:50.63 achieved at May's BMC meeting at Sportcity. This now ranks him 8th in the UK U/20 listings

ANDREW BURGESS SILVER Long jump 6.91m
Our Merseyside long jump champion and Northern U/20 Indoor & Outdoor champion has also made dramatic progress from last year's seventh place to achieve this year's superb silver medal. Had he been a little closer to his PB of 7.00m, achieved at the Malta Representative v Northern Counties match in April, he would have won gold.

NATHAN ROACH 200m 7th in the semi-final 22.62

Our Gt. Manchester Schools 200m champion for the second consecutive year produced a fine PB so it was a successful championship for him. This was his third 200m PB of the summer.

HANNAH DOHERTY 1500m 10th 4:43.48



Fantastic Year for Alice



2008 has been an outstanding year for 14yr old Sale Harrier, Alice Fitton.

She is the current British Champion at Modern Biathlon, (run/swim), Triathlon, (run/swim/shoot), Tetrathlon, (run/swim/shoot/fence), and Pentathlon, (run/swim/shoot/fence/show jump), and all at an age-group above her own!

Early in the year, despite being just 13 years old at the time, Alice was identified as a possible candidate to represent Great Britain at European level. In order to achieve the necessary ranking points, she has had to compete in the higher age-group of 'under 17yrs'. Undeterred by this, Alice not only went on to win the Series, attaining UK No1 ranking, but she also went on to win National Titles at Biathlon, Triathlon, Tetrathlon and Pentathlon as well.

In April, Alice was selected to lead the Great Britain Team at the prestigious European Cup, which was held in Pilzen, Czech Republic. Competing against the very best under 17yr olds in Europe, including athletes from the Eastern Block countries, she achieved a highly creditable Silver medal.

Having established herself as the Country's leading 'multi-disciplinary' athlete, Alice went on to lead the British campaign at The European Championships in Dublin. Despite a lacklustre performance in the shot, she managed to achieve fifth place in a 'World Class' field. Encouragement indeed, in the knowledge that she can compete in the age group for a further two years.

In a year that has seen Alice become the youngest ever British athlete to be awarded World Class Development Programme status, 2008 has indeed, surpassed her expectations and provides motivation for the season to come.

On the bright side we collected 12 gold, 7 silver and 7 bronze medals reflecting the quality of those who competed.



KATH WELLAM had a solid performance in the 400m flat winning in 61.45. JESSICA TAYLOR just narrowly missed out on 1st in the 100m and 200m sprints running near to her personal bests with 12.6 and 25.61! Jessica also won the

long jump just 7cm off her P.B with a leap of 5.47m. This performance was especially spectacular as she had only just made it for the start of the event, as she had travelled from York and had got caught up in major traffic diversions.

NICOLA CAHILL also did the team proud; she had to rush from working on the Saturday morning in the hope to make it for as many events as she could. Her first two of which - high jump and 100m hurdles, ran at the same time! After a speedy warm up, she did brilliantly storming into 2nd position in the hurdles with a time of 15.43, although she wasn't happy with her start. Straight over to the high jump Nic was disappointed with 1.50m, however she came 2nd and that's

not bad considering it was immediately after her sprint! That's the real spirit of the team!

The Manchester 4 x 5k Sizzlers in Wythenshawe Park were the summer highlight for most, but others had a busy summer:

JENNY CLINK: Now that Jenny's become discerning in her training and competing, she's come on in leaps & bounds. Following good performances in the Sizzlers, she had excellent runs in the Horwich road series and produced a PB in one of them. She was also 2nd lady in July's Offerton 10k with an encouraging 48.53

GARETH RAVEN has had a superb reason on roads as well as on the track. Following early summer victories in Salford 10k & Wilmslow half-marathon he recorded a superb PB of 29.39 in the May's BUPA Gt. Manchester Run. He then focused on a few track 5k's before recording a 10,000m PB of 29:32.71 at the UK Championships. Back to the roads and with an eye on an autumn half-marathon, Britain's top 10 marathoner recorded another massive PB of 49.15 in the Sale '10'. He topped off a magnificent summer by winning the 'Race The train' in Wales, completing the course five minutes faster than last year. CHRIS BRATT & PAUL ROWLEY also ran this tough but colourful event with Chris finishing 198th from 800 finishers in 1:47.41 & Paul 242nd in 1:52.05.

JOHN BATTERSBY (O/50) likes to race & this summer was as busy and as consistent as ever.

He ran the Platt Fields 10k in 40.00; bounced back from the curry-laden Sale '10' in early August to a more satisfying over-distance Gt. Warford '10' two weeks later and then the Birchwood 10k in 40.08 & then September's Trafford 10k where he crossed the line much slower 41.40.

IAN WEATHERALL: Our No.1 vet ran in the BMAF 5k Championships at Horwich in June and finished 13th in a time of 16.13 sec in the O/40 age-category. Following that he concentrated on the track & in July ran the veteran 1500m Championships. His time now ranks him12th nationally. After that, he competed in a couple of 800m races and his 2:03.08 at the BMC at Longford Park ranks him 4th in the UK

GEOFF BEATTIE (O/55): You should have seen Geoff's smile when he finally smashed through the 21-minute barrier in the rainsodden Manchester 5k Sizzler. Though questionable because of last-minute alterations, he confirmed his new benchmark with fine runs in the Blackburn 5k (20.51) and the 3rd Sizzler (20.50). Readily producing low 44's for 10k as in the Platt Field 10k, this year's BUPA Gt. Yorkshire run in 43.38 was a full minute faster than last year and... and he even threw in two half-marathons and the Sale '10' for good measure.

MARK FERNS struggled a bit this summer. He raced all four Sizzlers; the Offerton 10k (44.29); the Debdale Park 7k (25:22) and the Saddleworth '6' (42.07) but said," I was a bit disappointed with my summer races, still struggling to get back to where I was before my injury last Christmas. I'm still confident I can turn it round and be back to full strength the X-Country, which will be just after my Dublin Marathon in Oct.

DON GEORGE: Apart from picking up his first trophy for years in the Platt Fields 10k, the Club's longest serving member has also been re-juvenated over 5k! Now in the exalted O/70 age-category, Don ran three 'Sizzlers' with a superb best of 26.05; he also ran several of the monthly Alexander Park 5k races, again with a superb best of 26.04 in August's event. Keep it up. Don. You'll be passing all these youngsters!

LYNDA ROWLINSON is targeting the Manchester Parks series of five road races through the summer and whilst it's Garry's turn to be left holding the baby, Lynda ranks top in the O/45 category with three races completed. Likewise, SUSAN CREHAN ranks second in the O/50 category.

JANET FIELDEN (O/50) ran her first two Sizzlers ever with a best of 26.42. She joined PHILIPPA EDWARDS & DIANE HENIGAN for the Winston Ladies '5' mile race run from our Wythenshawe Track in July and all three should be happy with their performances (27:28), (28.32) and (29.55) respectively. She then rounded off with the Birchwood 10k in 58.51.

FECHIN McCORMICK's (O/55) target this summer was to try and keep on the right side of 22 minutes for 5k. He finally succeeded in the final Sizzler!

LEE WOODS showed he's continuing to make good, steady progress from long-term injury with a best of 17.45 & 37.23 in the Platt Fields 10k.

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
